HEATING ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

Help with home heating costs will be available across the state through the federal

Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LI-HEAP) administered by the Oklahoma Department of Human Services.

The application period for assistance through OKDHS will begin Tuesday, December 1. Applications will be accepted until allocated funding is spent.

Many, but not all households that receive public assistance through OKDHS may be automatically authorized for LIHEAP and will not need to make application. These households will be notified of their eligibility.

Eligibility for help through LIHEAP is based on household income and assets. Low-income households that do not receive public assistance may also be eligible for home heating assistance. It is important that persons requesting LIHEAP assistance have their household's latest heating bill and income information when applying. The maximum income guidelines are:

ABLE ACT OF 2009

The Achieving a Better Life Experience Act (ABLE) of 2009 (S 493/HR 1205), which is supported by over 40 national disability organizations has been introduced in both the U.S. Senate and House. The ABLE Act will give individuals with disabilities and their families the ability to save for their child's future just like every other American family, and help people with disabilities live full, productive lives in their communities.

The ABLE Act will allow individuals with disabilities to create a disability savings accounts or 'ABLE Accounts' that would accrue interest taxfree. The account could fund a variety of essential expenses for the individual, including medical and dental care. education, community based supports, employment training, assistive technology, housing, and transportation. Importantly, the legislation prohibits amounts held by, or paid or distributed from any ABLE accounts from being treated as income or assets when determining eligibility for benefits provide by any Federal benefits program.

Asset development is one step toward improving economic

self-sufficiency, and the legislation's focus on encouraging asset development will greatly incentivize people with disabilities to live more productive lives through earning and saving resources for their future.

HEALTH CARE LEGISLATION

The Justice for All Action
Network (JFAAN), a coalition of
disability-led organizations and
allies, applauds health care
legislation passed by the U.S.
House of
Representatives. Recently
passed in a House vote, the
legislation increases the
number of people with
disabilities covered by health
care and increases service
options for people with
disabilities.

Key points of the legislation included: expanding coverage to millions of people currently uninsured; a provision that makes it illegal for insurance companies to deny coverage based upon pre-existing conditions; and the inclusion of the CLASS ACT and the Community First Choice Option (CFC).

SSA ON COMPASSIONATE ALLOWANCES AND SCHIZOPHRENIA

The Social Security
Administration recently held
another public hearing on
Compassionate Allowances.
Testimony was heard from
some of the nation's leading
experts on schizophrenia about
possible methods of identifying
and implementing
Compassionate Allowances for
young adults with
schizophrenia.

Schizophrenia is a devastating disease that affects more than two million Americans, primarily individuals in their teens and twenties. The hearing will help potentially identify the most severe cases and consider bringing them under the Compassionate Allowances umbrella to expedite the processing of disability claims for applicants with medical conditions so severe that their conditions by definition meet Social Security's standards.

GRANT TARGETS RURAL, HOMELESS YOUTH

A 5-year, \$1 million grant will target foster children aged 16 to 20 years of age in rural areas who lack a support system or family structure and are about to age out of state custody through the Oklahoma Department of Human Services.

OKDHS is developing the Oklahoma Bridge to Independence Network, working with resources in the rural communities to develop support systems for rural, homeless youth.

Key partners in the project are Youth and Family Services,

Inc.; Oklahoma and the
National Resource Center for
Youth Services at the University
of Oklahoma; Oklahoma
Association of Youth Services;
Oklahoma Institute for Child
Advocacy and Governor's
Interagency Council on the
Homeless.

The cost is \$2 round trip in McAlester and \$4 for Krebs and Frink Chambers. Outside this area, fees are based on actual costs of gasoline needed to provide the service.
